

Funding Training and Conferences

Conferences and trainings offer families opportunities to learn, recharge, and connect with other families. Funding assistance for trainings and conferences may be available for families of CYSHCN. Funding resources include the following.

Governor’s Council for People with Disabilities (GCPD) Consumer Investment

Fund: The Consumer Investment Fund program offered by the GCPD allows persons with disabilities and their families to participate in conferences and events. In return, supported participants commit to share information learned and contribute to the independence, productivity, integration, and inclusion of people with disabilities. Medicaid Waiver Family and Caregiver Training Program: Anyone who receives the Family Supports Waiver or Community Integration and Habilitation Waiver may opt to spend up to \$5,000 of their yearly budget for Family and Caregiver Training. The funds may be used to provide training and education to parents, family members, or non-paid caregivers at workshops and conferences.

This service is coordinated through the waiver case manager.

IEP Parent Training: Parent training is a service that is available as a supportive related service under a student’s IEP. The training must be approved by the case conference committee and must be written into the IEP. The training is provided at no cost to the parent.

Conference Scholarships: Many conference hosts are aware that paying for conference expenses is burdensome to some families, and scholarships or reduced fees based on ability to pay are often offered. Before registering for a conference, ask about scholarship and grant opportunities. Maximize discounts, such as lodging or transportation discounts, offered in conjunction with the conference.

Diagnosis-Specific Grants or Scholarships: Small, local, diagnosis-specific groups may offer grants or scholarships to state or national conferences. These groups occasionally request a follow-up report be given to the local group.

Local Service Groups: Lion’s Club, Kiwanis, and other service groups occasionally accept applications for family needs, such as trainings.
